- NVCJA owns 93 acres adjacent to County parcels

2018 Land Purchase

- Increased the available land to 148 acres
- Three adjacent parcels
 - Two residential
 - One undeveloped agricultural



Master Plan Update

- Kick-off in early 2018
- Hughes Group Architects engaged to update 2014 document
 - Incorporate purchase of additional land
 - Gather project requirements and programming
 - Develop program for 5, 10, and 20 year anticipated growth
 - Develop Master Plan site concepts

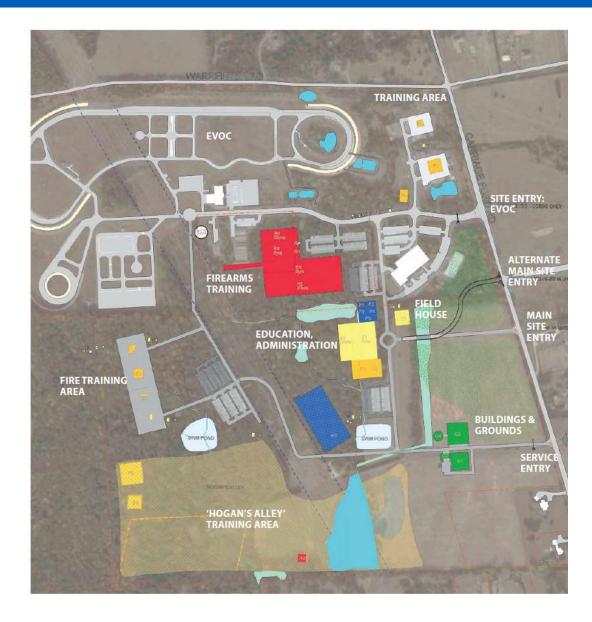
Critical needs

Master Plan – Site at Full Build-Out

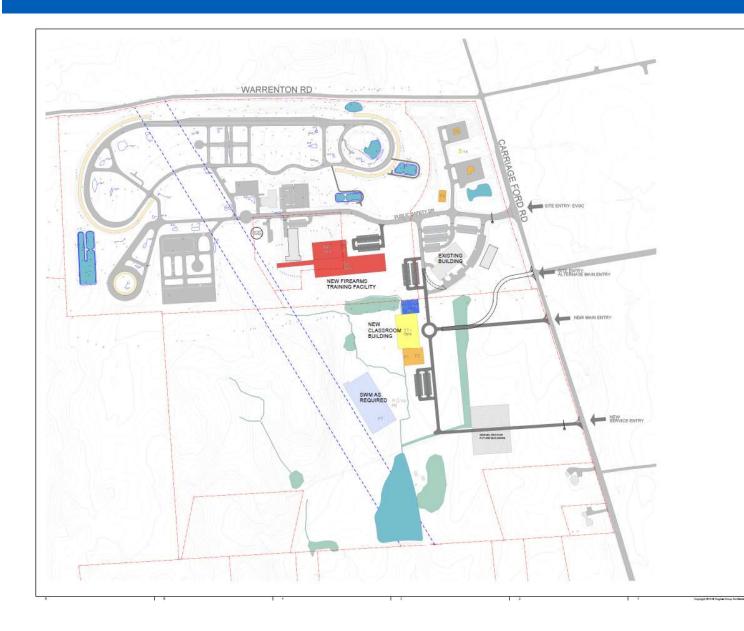

- Consider local supplements for state employees during FY23 budget process

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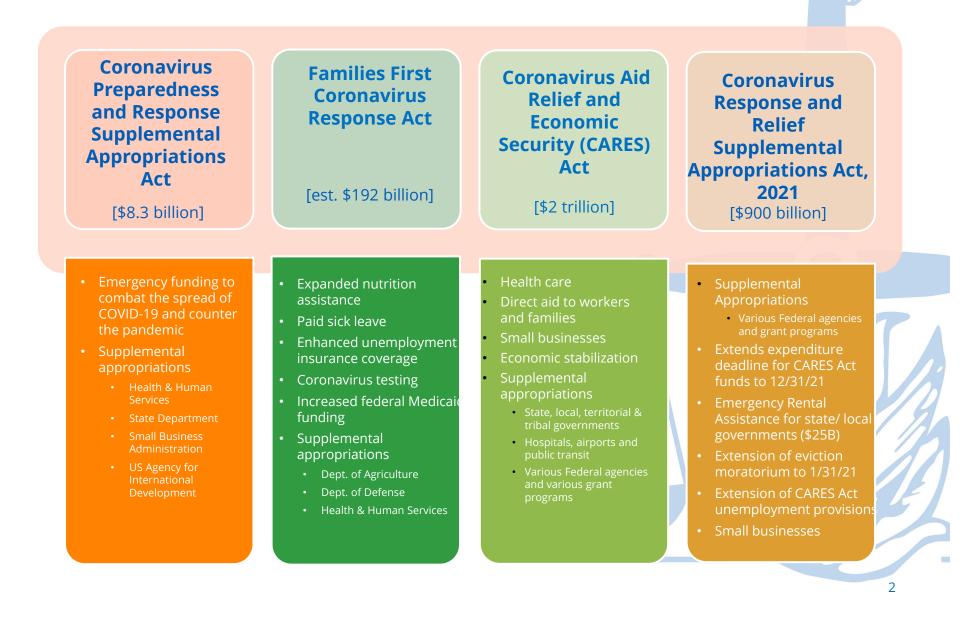

American Rescue Plan Act of 2021



- American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) signed into law on March 11, 2021
 - Almost \$1.9 trillion stimulus package
 - More than \$350 billion of new COVID-19 relief has been directly allocated to states, counties, cities and tribal governments

New Coronavirus Legislation



American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

[\$1.88 trillion]

• State and Local Fiscal Aid

- \$195.3B for states and DC
- \$130.2B for local governments
 - \$65.1B cities / \$65.1B counties
- \$20B tribal governments
- \$4.5B for territories
- \$10B Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund
 - Payments to states,, territories, and tribal governments
 - Use for critical capital projects "directly enabling work, education, and health monitoring, including remote options, in response to the public health emergency"
 - \$100M minimum payments, remainder is allocated using a three-part formula based on overall population, rural population, population below the poverty line
 - \$2B Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency fund for eligible revenue sharing counties and eligible Tribes

- Education Stabilization Fund
 - \$122.7B for grants to state educational agencies
 - At least 90% must be allocated to local educational agencies (LEAs)
 - LEAs must use 20% to address learning loss
 - LEAs must submit reopening plans
- Emergency Rental Assistance
 - \$18.6B in funding to Treasury for emergency rental and utility assistance that would be allocated to states, territories, counties, and cities to help stabilize renters during the coronavirus pandemic, and help rental property owners of all sizes continue to cover their costs
 - \$9.96B to states, territories, and tribes to address the ongoing needs of homeowners struggling to afford their housing due directly or indirectly to the impacts of the coronavirus pandemic by providing direct assistance with mortgage payments, property taxes, property insurance, utilities, and other housing related costs
 - \$2.5 B for high-need grantees

- \$50B to FEMA's Disaster Relief Fund
- \$3B Economic Development Administration
- \$30B Transit
- \$8B Airports
- \$3B Aerospace manufacturing
- Low Income Water & Energy Assistance
 - \$4.5B to HHS for home energy assistance
 - \$500 M to HHS to assist with payment for drinking water and wastewater expenses
- Vaccinations
 - \$415B in increased funding for a national vaccination program, COVID-19 testing, contact tracing, scientific research and development, and manufacturing of pandemic-related medical supplies

- Emergency Paid Sick Leave Credits
 - Grants state and local governments as well as Federal governmental instrumentalities that are taxexempt 501(c)(1) organizations the ability to access the paid sick time and paid family leave credits under the Families First Coronavirus Relief Act (FFCRA)
 - Access to credits for leave provided March 31, 2021 through September 30, 2021
- Direct Stimulus Payments
 - Provide \$1,400 for each taxpayer in addition to \$1,400 per dependent
 - Phases out between: \$75,000 and \$80,000 of AGI for single filers; \$112,500 and \$120,000 of AGI for head of household filers; \$150,00 and \$160,000 of AGI for joint filers

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

• Aid to Businesses

- Added \$7.25B to Paycheck Protection Program (PPP)
- \$15B Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL)
- \$25B Restaurant Revitalization Fund
- Additional \$1.5B for shuttered venue operations grants
- \$86B for failing multi-employer pension plans
- \$10.4B to support agriculture

Public Health Workers

- \$9.1B in public health workforce-related support
 - Includes \$7.66B for establishing, expanding and sustaining the public health workforce by making awards to state, local and territorial public health departments
- \$100M for Medical Reserve Corps

- Other Provisions
 - Provides additional funding for agriculture and nutrition programs, including the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
 - Provides childcare and programs for older Americans and their families
 - Provides mental health and substance-use disorder services

County Allocation



- County expected to receive approximately \$92 million direct payment from U.S. Treasury
 - Payments to local governments will be made in two installments first half 60 days after enactment, second half one year later
 - Anticipate 1st payment May 11, 2021
 - Public Hearing/B&A planned for May-Jun 2021
- Funds must be spent by December 31, 2024
- U.S. Treasury expected to issue further guidance very soon

Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Guiding Principles

- Temporary nature of ARPA funding; funds are non-recurring (i.e.; one-time)
 - Avoid creating new programs or add-ons that require an ongoing financial commitment
 - Replenish reserves used to offset revenue declines during the pandemic ; rebuild financial flexibility/stability and restore fiscal resiliency
 - Invest in critical infrastructure but assess any on-going operating costs associated with the project
- Collaboration with other governments and organizations
 - Stay cognizant of state-level ARPA efforts
 - Consider regional initiatives, including partnerships with other ARPA recipients
- Carefully plan
 - Use other dedicated grants and programs first; save ARPA funding for priorities not eligible for other federal/state assistance programs
 - Spread expenditures over the period (thru December 31, 2024) to enhance stability
 - Allow adequate time to carefully consider all alternatives for the prudent use of ARPA funds
