Lieutenant John Hornaday

November FMO Team member of the Month Lieutenant John Hornaday

During November 2019, Lt. John Hornaday took the initiative to conduct numerous spot checks of restaurants focusing on the kitchen exhaust hood and suppression systems. Based on previous fire incidents with kitchen cooking equipment in restaurants, the PWC Fire Marshal's Office identified that the critical fire and life safety systems were being serviced and inspected by some unlicensed contractors. Lt. Hornaday specifically concentrated on the hood systems to identify unlicensed contractors that were failing to fulfill their contractual services at a large expense to county businesses, especially small businesses.

During his inspections, Lt. Hornaday recognized that unlicensed contractors were working in the county and failing to provide their contracted service while still being paid for its completion. Lt. John Hornaday conducted a spot check campaign to identify businesses

that fell victim to these unlicensed companies and to see that they received the service that they paid for. These unlicensed companies were contacted and made aware of the code and need for proper licensing and the duty to fulfill their contracts properly. As a result of Lt. Hornaday's efforts, 12 unlicensed companies were identified working inside PWC, some fraudulently representing the work they were contracted to conduct. Fifteen of the eighteen PWC businesses checked were affected by these unlicensed companies.

Lt. Hornaday identified an issue and took actions to pinpoint and rectify the problem. This resulted in thousands of dollars in savings to local businesses. John has continued to pursue these companies to ensure that they comply with the codes and the laws. The Prince William County Fire Marshals, as part of our Education and Enforcement mission, look to educate business owners and contractors to ensure that all parties understand the requirements are protected from unlicensed contractors. This campaign will continue and is one of the reasons it makes PWC the safest place to live, work, and play.

For Lt. Hornaday's initiative and effort, he deserved the November 2019 FMO Award. In addition to the recognition from the PWC Fire Code Official, Assistant Chief Matt Smolsky, he was also awarded the sought after "Jimmy Chip".

December FMO Team member of the Month

Due to medical leave for one inspector, increased leave requests during the holidays, and an increase in inspection requests to get projects completed before the end of the year, the Fire Marshal's Office (FMO) was challenged to meet the increased needs for daily inspections. Jim Tanner is a part-time inspector that averages 40 hours in a two week period. He volunteered to work extra days to perform the needed inspections and manage the increased workload.

Part-time inspectors usually average approximately 35-45 new construction inspections per month due to the scope and complexity of the inspections. Inspector Tanner worked the extra days and performed a total of 103 inspections during the month of December. With the extra days, Jim was able to significantly increase the inspection completion rate without compromising the expected level of integrity of those inspections. This additional effort allowed the FMO to maintain it's high level of customer service and availability to keep development projects moving forward. For that willingness and effort, Inspector Tanner is deserving of the FMO award for

December. Besides the certificate and recognition from the PWC Fire Code Official, Assistant Chief Matt Smolsky, Jim also was awarded the coveted "Jimmy Chip".

Prince William County Fire Marshal's Office Reminds Everyone Check for Product Recalls

On Thursday, January 30, 2020, a fire occurred at a single-family home in Bristow. The Prince William County Fire Marshal's Office investigated the fire. Lieutenant Paul Smiljanich (CFI) and Lieutenant Joey Bloedel had determined that the fire originated within the dishwasher. During their investigation it was discovered that there was an open recall on this dishwasher due to a fire hazard. They spoke with two neighbors; one who had replaced it due to the recall and the other who was unaware of it until they checked the model and serial number. Their unit was also part of the recall. What's New in Emergency Management

- EM staff kicked off the new year with a strategic planning meeting to review accomplishments over the previous year, review current projects, and set goals for this year and beyond.
- EM leadership is in the process of filling the vacant Planner position and hopes to have a candidate selected in the next few weeks.
- The Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is being upgraded with new technology; instead of paper resources, tablets will be provided for note taking and class materials. Electronic flipcharts will also be available for use during meetings, classes, and activations. Along with EOC upgrades, the EM Team Room (future Policy Room) is getting a face lift; it is being converted from office cubicles into a break-out room for EOC activations and meetings. The room will have printer and plotter capabilities and will be able to screen-share with the EOC.
- Sustainable water during a power outage is important for critical infrastructure such as hospitals; EM has been working on a project to obtain fillable water tanks to supplement water for critical infrastructure in case of a prolonged power outage. The equipment is currently in county facilities and ready to be deployed if needed.
- The county bids farewell to Mary Foley, Director of Volunteer Prince William, as she is retiring after 27 years of dedicated service to Prince William County and the National Capital Region. Regional representatives said goodbye and presented a certificate of appreciation to Mary during her last meeting at the Council of Governments in Washington, D.C. Although Mary is retiring, we will still see her in the community, and her legacy will continue through the partnership between Volunteer Prince William and the Office of Emergency Management.
- Despite the unusually warm weather pattern this winter, the Office of Emergency Management (EM) encourages you to stay ahead of the crowds in stores by preparing for snow before it is forecasted. Don't stand in line, prepare ahead of time! Make sure you have extra gas for your generator, insulate your pipes with newspaper or plastic to keep them from freezing, turn your faucets on to drip to prevent your pipes from freezing, and much more! 
