Prince William 4-H'ers Win Big at the Northern District Food Challenge



Through participating in the 4-H Food & Nutri in Project, youth learn how to prepare nutritious and safe meals and sha adopt behaviors that can help reduce their risk for chronic disease. The 4-H Food Challenge contest challenges teams of 4-H members to create a dish using only a predetermined set of ingredients. From these ingredients, team members must identify and prepare the dish, then make a presentation about it to the judges.

Prince William 4-H sent three teams of 4-H'ers to the Northern District 4-H Food Challenge in Culpeper on Saturday, April 23rd. Team Clover of Kettle Run 4-H Club, a mixed age group team (juniors and seniors, ages 9-19), placed first in their age grouping. Senior's Team Ninja (ages 14 and up) with members from Kettle Run 4-H Club and Trigger Time 4-H Club placed second and within just a few points of The Spice Grills with members from Trigger Time 4-H Club and Phantom Riders. Both senior teams qualified for the National 4-H Food Challenge Contest to be held later this year at the Texas State Fair.

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



STORYTELLING TIPS, Submitted by Hermon Maclin

STEP ONE: Gather your creatives in a comfortable setting. Spark a brainstorming activity by asking each youth to write a true story about themselves, include their feelings and things that they think people don't really know about them. Ask them to volunteer to read their story out loud to the group. This will help get the storytelling wheels turning and help them open up and get to know each other better and trust each other creating a feeling that'll help them work freely as a creative team.

STEP Two: Once they have finished sharing their personal stories, have them brainstorm ideas for the story they want their video to tell. Write their story suggestions on the wall and have them select the one story they want to go with.

STEP THREE: Once they have decided on a story to tell, have them answer the following six questions that will basically create an outline for their script and video. The tutorial found at the following link will explain why answering these questions is so important. https://youtu.be/F7i3w6XW_2Q

STEP FOUR: Storyboarding - Create a newspaper style comic strip using a separate sheet of typing paper for each scene drawing pictures to show what's happening in the scene and the location/surroundings and add captions describing what's going on in the scene, camera angles etc. These scenes/sheets can be moved around as needed as the story evolves.

STEP FIVE: Shoot the video with a cellphone. Film scenes making sure the video and audio is good quality. Lighting is important and hold the phone close to the person speaking to get good audio or use a cordless microphone that's compatible with cellphones.

FINAL STEPS: Edit video (we can help with that), Critique and tweak (We can help with this), Submit final video



ELEMENTARY ENRICHMENT PRESENTATIONS

Virginia Cooperative Extension (VCE) is an educational outreach program of Virginia's land-grant universities: Virginia Tech and Virginia State University. The goal of the VCE Speakers Bureau is to connect youth with VCE experts on a wide range of topics. These experts will convey research-based information to your students and enhance your students' learning. These presentations are open to school classrooms, 4-H Clubs, and homeschool groups, and are offered at no cost. HONEYBEES AND BEEKEEPING: Phil Blevins, Agriculture and Natural Resources Extension Agent will teach students the importance of honeybees and an overview of beekeeping. This presentation is for HONEYBEES AND students in grades K-5 and is 30 minutes long.



LEARN TO SPEAK DOG: Dr. Erica Feuerbacher, Professor at Virginia Tech, will go over how dogs communicate, what their warning signals are, and how to stay safe around dogs. This presentation is for students in grades K-5 and is 30 - 45 minutes long.



GOODS FROM THE WOODS: In this presentation, Lenah Nguyen, 4-H Extension Agent will teach participants will about tree anatomy, the importance of forestry products in their everyday lives, and the differences between renewable and non-renewable resources. This presentation can be delivered to any K- 12 classroom but targets SOL 4.8 - Virginia's Watersheds and Natural Resources. This presentation is 30 minutes long.



AFRICULTURE: Michael Carter Jr., Small Farm Resource Center Coordinator at Virginia State University introduces students to the multitude of contributions by people of African descent to agree the students are the students to the multitude of the students are the student adapted for students from grades K -12 and can be 30 - 60 minutes long.



VIRGINIA WILDLIFE: Using furs, skulls, and live animals, Bonnie Tillotson, 4-H Extension Agent will help youth learn about Virginia Wildlife. Youth will Tearn about native species, predators vs. prey, how skulls differ between herbivores, omnivores, and carnivores, and what wildlife need to survive. This presentation is for students in grades 3 - 5 and is 30 - 45 minutes long.



SIMPLE MACHINES WE USE EVERY DAY: Ruth Wallace, 4-H Extension Agent, will guide students through a discussion of simple machines that we use all the time without realizing how much help they give us. The presentation involves going through the simple act of making chocolate pudding and discussing each simple machine used. This presentation targets VA Science SOL 3.2 and is 15 minutes long.



EXPLORING WATERSHEDS: Ruth Wallace, 4-H Extension Agent, can provide multiple presentations about all aspects of watershed education - topography, water quality, place-based stewardship, freshwater ecology, erosion, and conservation. SOLs addressed include VA Science 6.6, 6.8. 6.9, LS.5, LS.9. These presentations can be adapted for students in grades 3 - 8 and can be 15 - 45 minutes long.



TEACHING YOUR DOG AND YOUR FRIENDS WITH **KINDNESS:** Dr. Erica Feuerbacher, Professor at Virginia Tech, will go over in simple terms how to use rewards (positive reinforcement) to train dogs to do tricks and behave better. She will also tie this into how we can interact with other humans better using these same approaches--telling people what we like about what they do, saying thank you etc. There will be plenty of dog videos! This presentation is for students in grades K-5 and is 30 minutes long.



BLINK! THINK! MAKE YOUR CHOICE; USE YOUR **VOICE:** When we place children in the care of other adults, we trust they will be safe; but we know we cannot be totally sure. When a supposedly trusted authority figure tells a child to do something wrong, it is a confusing and potentially dangerous experience. Dr. Eric Kaufman, Professor at Virginia Tech, will introduce students to an age-appropriate strategy for intelligent disobedience. The intention is to teach the children how to make sensible decisions about instructions that they are given by adults. This presentation is for students in grades K-5 and is 15 -30 minutes long.



DAIRY: Jeremy Daubert and Cynthia Martel, Dairy Science Extension Agents, can talk to your students on just about any topic related to Dairy Science. They can present to any students in grades K-12 and speak for 15 - 30 minutes.



THE WORLD AS AN APPLE: Mandi Dolan, 4-H Extension Agent, will help students examine soil horizons and investigate best management practices for soil conversation through this interactive lesson targeting SOLs 3.10 and 4.9. This presentation is for students in grades 3 - 5 and is 30 - 45 minutes long.



SOIL SCIENCE: Ruth Wallace, 4-H Extension Agent, teaches students about soil components, organisms in soil, and the importance of soil as a natural resource. This presentation targets VA Science SOL 3.6 and 3.8 and is 15 - 30 minutes long.



SUGAR BUSTERS SUGAR BUSTERS: Erin Morgan, 4-H Extension Agent, will help students compare the serving sizes and added sugar content of foods served at meals and various family celebrations. This presentation targets Health Education SOL 4.2 and is 30 minutes long.



SOILS FOR THE GARDEN AND THE FARM: Tim Ohlwiler, Horticulture Extension Agent, will introduce students to soils and soil health. Topics covered will include testing, mapping, organic matter, and cover ILS FOR THE BARDEN crops. This presentation can be adapted for students AND THE FARM in grades 3 - 12 and can be 15 - 60 minutes long.

MIDDLE SCHOOL ENRICHMENT PRESENTATIONS

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AFRICULTURE: Michael Carter Jr., Small Farm Resource Center Coordinator at Virginia State University introduces students to the multitude of contributions by people of African descent to agriculture.
