Applicants should have at least 3 years experience with 4-H and be between 15 and 19 years-old.

Working together as Virginia All Stars, youth make an impact in developing self-motivated youth and implementing interactive youth development education programs for all of Virginia. our core pillar areas of Agriculture, Civic Engagement, Healthy Living, and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics), giving pillar winners the chance to share how 4-H changed their lives and how they have used the skills they gained in 4-H to change the lives of others.

Each of the four Pillar Winners will receive:

- A \$500 mini-grant to develop a significant community project.
- Recognition at a formal award ceremony.
- A full scholarship to attend Virginia 4-H State Congress the week in Summer 2023.
- An opportunity to be featured as the Virginia 4-H Youth Spokesperson for their pillar area.
- An opportunity to represent Virginia 4-H at the national summit for their pillar area.
- Support and mentorship to apply for the 2024 National 4-H Youth in Action Awards.
- An official reference letter from the Virginia State 4-H Program Leader, Jeremy C. Johnson.

With the school year beginning, and the new 4-H year right around the corner, it's a great time to take Grant the Every Kid Outdoors Program from the National Park Service. The program was the state of the Every Kid Outdoors Program from the National Park Service. The program was the state of the Every Kid Outdoors Program from the National Park Service. renewed and expanded over the years to now include a wide variety of public lands.

Free Passes! The program is very simple: every 4th grade student (or home school equivalent) in the United States is entitled to get one Every Kid Outdoors pass which is valid from September 1 – August 31 (so it is valid all the way through next summer). The pass will admit that student, any other youth under the age of 16 in the party (other youth do not have to be 4th graders), and up to 3 adults free to any site which charges

an entry fee. This does not cover other fees like parking fees, camping permits, etc. but covering the entry fees can represent a significant savings to families. Any eligible student/parent can visit https://www.everykidoutdoors.gov to print the free pass or to get more information.

Opportunities for Club or In-School Programming! Educators are also able to print out passes from the website for all of their 4th graders, plus there are activity guides that can be downloaded. Extension Agents and club leaders ARE considered educators for the purposes of this program! All you will need to do is visit https://www.everykidoutdoors.gov/ educators.htm, download any activity guides you would like, and fill out the information to print out the passes. Enter "Virginia 4-H Program" in the box asking for a school or organization name.

The activity guides were developed by the National Park Service, and they are easily adaptable to in-school settings, or for clubs, etc. The four activity guides are: Exploring Federal Lands & Waters, Environmental Stewardship, Our Nation's Native Peoples, and Citizen Science.

Where the Pass Can Be Used? The pass can be used at most fee-based sites administered by the following federal agencies: National Park Service • Bureau of Land Management • Bureau of Reclamation • National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration • United States Fish & Wildlife Service • United States Forest Service • United States Army Corps of Engineers

The beginning of the 4-H year is a great time to be thinking about visiting our national parks and recreation areas. Virginia alone has some 22 National Park Service sites which range from Revolutionary War battlefields and natural landmarks, to Civil Rights monuments and cultural heritage. You can find these online at https://www.nps.gov/state/va/index.htm.

Many parks also offer educational programming which support our 4-H pillar areas of Agriculture, Civic Engagement, Healthy Living, and STEM. 4-H Clubs are open to youth ages 5-19. They can be established in-school, after school, or as independent clubs, and can be teacher or volunteer led.



Team Building






