



Celebrate Waste and Recycling Workers the Week of June 17th

Prince William, VA, April 28, 2023 –Prince William County residents, businesses, and organizations are encouraged to celebrate National Waste and Recycling Workers Week, June 11-17, and recognize the men and women that work daily to keep our communities and streets clean and safe.

What began as National Garbage Man Day recognition- June 17, 2012- became a National Waste and Recycling Workers Week celebration. A week gives communities, companies, and organizations more time to show appreciation for their trash and recycling collectors' critical contributions to public health.

In addition to collecting trash, the employees of the solid waste industry are also pioneers in advancing technologies such as recycling, renewable and sustainable energy, and reducing our dependence on fossil fuels. Match that with the clear impact on community cleanliness and hygiene; the modern-day waste and recycling worker deserves more than our garbage every week.

National Safety Month is also in June. The goal of this National Safety Council designation is to increase awareness of the leading safety and health risks facing employees and decrease the risk for workplace injuries and deaths in the U.S. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, waste and recycling workers rank 7 out of 10 on the list of fatal job injuries in 2021. The most common cause of death for these workers is being struck by a garbage truck or other vehicle, which makes safety an essential focus for Waste and Recycling Workers Week, too.

On June 15 and 16, the Prince William County Solid Waste Division will show its appreciation to industry workers with a special treat and a safety reminder message.

During the week of June 17, households and businesses are encouraged to recognize the solid waste industry members serving them. There are lots of ways to show support and appreciation for the people doing these dangerous and vital jobs:

- Safety First -slow down and pay extra attention when approaching or passing a collection vehicle.
- Follow the guidelines for size and weight limitations and types of materials discarded in the regular trash, recycling, and yard waste bins.
- Make sure all household trash is in a bag, and bags are securely closed.
- Do not set trash bags outside the cart.
- Do not put hazardous materials, including batteries, in the trash.
- Use caution when putting harmful items in the trash, such as glass or hot ashes.
- Consider ways to reduce, reuse and recycle things at home, school and work instead of throwing them in the garbage.
- Wave to your collector (keep six feet distance) to show your awareness and appreciation of their efforts.
- Express thanks and appreciation with a chalk drawing on the sidewalk or driveway, a cardboard sign, or a banner taped to your trash cart/can.
- Leave a snack or bottle of water for your collection crew.
- Give the landfill and compost facility attendants an air "high five."

Many of these suggestions are appropriate to practice year-round. STEPS TO SUPPORTING LOCAL FOOD AND FARMING

1) Take a trip to a local farm or farm stand to learn what the farm produces.

2) Learn what foods are in season and try to build your menu around them.

3) Visit and learn what's available at local farmers markets.

4) Encourage your favorite grocery stores and restaurants to source food locally.

5) Experiment with drying, canning, jamming, or otherwise preserving fruits and vegetables.

6) Start a conversation with local farmers, agricultural and elected officials about how to shape policies that strengthen agriculture and the local food landscape.







Growing, Buying, and Eating Local Food: The What, Why, and How?

There are many reasons to support local agriculture and food producers. People's reasons may vary depending on their individual and household situations. When interest in local foods surged in the early 2000s and after the financial crisis of 2008, there was a significant effort to define, and possibly debate, what local food means. Early definitions of "local food" centered on food miles and proximity to one's home. Defined boundaries ranged from 30, 100, 250, to 400 miles, while others defined local food by geographic or watershed boundaries. Nutritionist Joan Gussow, a professor and an early proponent of local, organic food and gardening, proposed trying to buy local food within a leisurely day's drive of our homes with a goal of maintaining a thriving countryside of farms.

With any decision, even the smallest, we are in a tangible way building the world we want to see and experience. Our decisions and choices matter - support of local food and farming is relational and one strategy to deeply root people in a place and solidify farming as integral to local history, landscape, and culture. Ultimately, the goal of food and farming is (or should be) to advance the health and well-being of individuals and the population as a whole. In growing, buying, and eating local, I recommend starting small and in manageable chunks of time, effort, and financial resources for yourself and household. You know your context and capabilities. Growing a container garden or small plot of tomatoes and peppers may be a good first manageable step and what can be more local than planting, growing, harvesting, cooking, and eating your own food. Once you succeed at that level, you might then plant a garden and grow as much of your own food as possible.

Growing, buying, and eating local is simply practical, and does not need to be complicated and overwhelming – even a small amount of change and investment in your local community can have a big impact. Virginia Cooperative Extension can help you learn more about the local food landscape and informational resources such as Virginia Grown and Buy Fresh Buy Local.

Vegetarian Enchilada Casserole



Ingredients (Makes 8 servings):

- 2 teaspoons canola oil
- 1 medium red onion chopped
- 1 medium zucchini grated or diced
- 1 (15.5 oz) can low sodium black beans rinsed and drained

Achieving the Physical **Activity Guidelines** Step: Strength Training

Muscle strengthening exercises should be done at least **2 days per week**.

Muscle strengthening exercises make the muscles do more work than they are used to doing during daily activities.

No specific amount of time is recommended, but you should repeat each exercise to the point it is difficult to do another repetition.

A variety of activities are necessary to achieve balanced muscle strength.

Aim to engage a variety of muscles shoulders, arms, abdomen, legs, hips, chest, and back.

You can lift weights, use resistance bands, climb stairs, and more.


