Field Naming Request

Vida Carroll presented a letter to the Commission and Director Hendler-Voss from the Brentsville District Little League to request naming Field #6 at Nokesville Park. Without objection the Chair directed the Secretary to add this request to next month's agenda.

Director Time

Director Seth Hendler-Voss provided the following updates: Budget updates

- On March 25, there will be a budget work session at McCoart regarding agency vacancies. Seth will attend to answer any question regarding DPR vacancies.
- On April 1, there will be a BOCS Q and A session regarding department budget initiatives in the proposed budget
- 5 year CIP- the BOCS has done a great job providing resources. There is \$1.2m in the proposed FY26 budget for maintenance and new maintenance positions. Additionally, the CXO has proposed \$2.5m dedicated to expansionary park and trail items in FY 27 and an additional \$5m in FY28 and beyond.
- Seth wanted to clear up any confusion regarding the funding Charlie Grymes (PWTSC)
 is advocating for. Mr. Grymes is advocating for an additional 5 million over and above
 any proposed funding specifically for trail land acquisition and building.
- Seth also shared that the American Battlefield Trust is pursuing a land acquisition of 500 acres and would ultimately deed this land to the County. The county investment needed to bring this to fruition would be \$8m.

Upcoming dates and events

- Locust Shade Park/Marina opening date is April 3
- Lake Ridge Park/Marina opening date is April 5

- Neabsco Regional Park Kayak Launch Ribbon Cutting/Historic Marker Ceremony April 16 at 1 pm. Commissioners may hear concerns over perceived disruption of a beaver damn at the kayak launch, but the lodge is upstream of the launch, They may also hear concerns over no vehicular access to the launch. At this time there is no funding for vehicular access, access will require portage.
- Staff Picnic will be May 6th at 11:30 at Splashdown Waterpark. The rain is May 84
- Volunteer Appreciation Picnic is April 26 at Cloverdale Park
- April 28th there is a Transportation hosted Ribbon Cutting at Long Park for the Intersection improvements
- Free movie nights will be hosted on May 9th at Splashdown, May 30th at Vets, and June 13th at Chinn
- Fridays at 5 will kick off in June.
- The Chris Thom Field Naming Resolution was removed from the April 1 BOCS agenda. The Director will share more information as it is received.
- May 16th is the Historic Dumfries Walking Tour
- June 14th is the Dumfries Tavern Night

Capital Projects

- Forest Greens Golf Clubhouse renovation is under way. Supervisor Bailey would like to add some proffers to the project and expand the project.
- Hellwig Turf project is nearly complete, play on the field will begin early April
- Ned Distiller House vegetation clearing has been completed
- Long Park Lights will be on soon

Other updates

- Staff have submitted an application to the NRPA Gold Medal Program.
- We are just 28 lifeguards away from fully staffed for the upcoming pool season.






