4-H CIVIC ENGAGEMENT IN ACTION

Thanks to what I've learned through 4-H - especially through *Prince William 4-H Engage Locally!*, where we meet and talk with local leaders, and from my experiences attending *Virginia 4-H Day at the Capitol* - I felt confident writing a letter to the Manassas City Council about a topic that means a lot to me: backyard chickens. Here's the letter I sent:

To whom this may concern,

Backyard chickens should be allowed back into Manassas City's backyards. They're a great way to support sustainable living, reduce food waste, and have access to fresh eggs - especially when there are clear rules in place.

Can you imagine waking up every morning and walking outside, with a little basket in hand, through the dew covered grass, making your way to a coop, filled with chickens, all excited to see you? You collect your own eggs to make a delicious and savory breakfast for your family, or yourself, or roommate. Countless cities around us allow this. So why not Manassas?

We could have fresh eggs, and seeing as the prices are going up, that is very helpful. Chickens provide a level of sustainability, as they will eat just about anything: table scraps, grass, even their own eggs. So yes, you'd need to still buy some form of chicken feed, but thanks to their dietary habits, you will have less waste and garbage. Chickens produce a natural fertilizer that can turn even Virginia clay into a very nice rich soil for growing all kinds of crops or plants. We already have a small vegetable garden, and being able to use chicken manure would make it even better. It's organic, more affordable, and would help us grow healthier food - not just eggs, but vegetables too. It's nature's recycling.

It is not just my opinion. This already works in other cities. According to Earth911, backyard chickens help reduce landfill waste, provide high-quality fertilizer, and lower the carbon footprint of household food production, all while promoting sustainable living in urban areas.

Raising your own food is powerful. No factories. No chemicals. No mystery. Just real food you can trust. Eggs from backyard chickens are healthier, fresher, and tastier than store-bought and when you're taking care of hens, you know exactly how they're treated and what they're eating.

Some people would say the noise or the smell would be an issue. But if you only get hens, they're quiet. So a specification to only getting hens would be an easy way to fix that issue. And odor is not a problem if you clean the coop. There can be rules put in place to limit the number of chickens and require frequent cleaning. People also say that chickens attract pests and predators, but as long as you secure your coops and have the proper food storage, that won't happen. Lastly, some might say that "Chickens are unsanitary" but permits and health inspections can keep everything safe and neighbor-friendly.

Chickens also teach real-world lessons. Through 4-H, I've learned how to incubate eggs, care for chicks, and tend adult hens. Over spring break, I even became a chicken tender. No, not the KFC kind, but for a friend's flock. I fed them, gathered eggs, and kept the coop clean. I didn't get to do this when I was younger, but I wish I had. It taught me real responsibility, and showed me the value of knowing where your food comes from.

Urban schools are adopting this kind of learning. For example, Burley Elementary School in Chicago built a chicken coop as part of their Eco:Lab sustainability program. Students there care for the chickens, collect eggs, and learn about sustainability and animal care first hand. This hands-on experience helps students connect with the food sources and understand the importance of environmental stewardship.

Chickens are not just animals - they are a step toward independence and sustainability. I have several friends in Nokesville alone who've shared their experiences of keeping backyard chickens, and every one of them say the same thing: it's frustrating that Manassas City does not allow this.

Please give us the chance to make this right. With clear rules and respectful care, backyard chickens can make a big difference. Sincerely,

would've eaten it - but I asked if I could try to hatch it.

What really started it all was something that happened while I was volunteering at Farm Field Days with 4-H. I was helping show chickens to the younger kids, and during the event, one of the hens laid an egg. The owner of the chicken, Mrs. Moore, gave me the egg to take home. Most people

We got a small incubator, and I took care of the egg, turning it and monitoring the temperature until it hatched. I named the chick Akiva. But because backyard chickens aren't allowed in Manassas, I wasn't allowed to keep her. Luckily, one of our 4-H families had a coop and took her in.

That experience, and everything I'd learned from 4-H, gave me the confidence to speak up and share why backyard chickens can be a good thing for families, education, and sustainability — especially when done responsibly. I'm proud of what I wrote and thankful for the 4-H leaders and programs that helped me feel prepared to take this step.

DECLARATIONS ARE OPEN

ALL DECLARATIONS MUST BE COMPLETED BY JULY I AT 11:59 PM.

- ANY Horse or Pony that a youth MAY show at the State Show must be declared in 4HOnline in order to be eligible to show.
- Please be prepared when beginning your declarations with current photos of your animal, Coggins test date, and an accurate
 height measurement. The correct measurement is imperative, as it is tied to "Animal Type" and linked to specific classes within
 the entry system. If the height entered is incorrect, it will affect your ability to enter classes. If you notice your height is
 incorrect, you must re-add that animal as a new animal in order to input the correct measurement, the system will not allow
 changes.
- If you are declaring a Horse/Pony that you declared last year or in a previous year, you do have the option to re-declare a previously added animal. Please note, if your height/animal type is incorrect due to a previous entry error, you will need to add a new animal and provide all new information. There is no opportunity to change the Animal Type. Additionally, if using an animal from a previous year, please ensure that you upload a CURRENT Coggins Test and edit to reflect the updated Coggins Test date for 2025.


