Community Partner Applicant	Donation Award	Service Provided
Youth for Tomorrow	\$ 75,000	Program provides access to quality outpatient behavioral health care for underserved and disadvantaged populations of PWC.
Virginia Women and Family Support Center (VAWFSC)	\$ 75,000	A 24 months long-term housing program dedicated to housing women who are pregnant and homeless and their children. Our holistic approach addresses the immediate crisis of homelessness. Our comprehensive program addresses trauma, physical and maternal health of residents in our program.
Habitat for Humanity PWC	\$ 75,000	Habitat provides partially forgivable mortgages on renovated homes and critical home repairs for households earning less than 60% AMI. Recipients contribute to their project through volunteer hours or a portion of the cost based on their income. Using volunteer labor and materials donated or provided at cost, our projects cost \$2,000-\$20,000 each.
Rainbow Riding	\$ 50,000	Therapeutic Riding (TR) and Equine-Assisted Therapy (EAT) uses the horse's (Rainbow currently has 10 equines) ability to re/act to emotional and physical energy, read and communicate verbal and no-verbal clues, and capacity to literally "elevate" a rider to improve physical, developmental, intellectual, and mental health/behavioral disabilities.
CASA (Children's Intervention Services), Inc.	\$ 10,000	A non-profit 501c3 organization appointed by the Juvenile Justice Court to stand by children who have been removed from their homes due to abuse and neglect.
Women Giving Back	\$ 60,000	Human Service Programs for County residents in crisis: (1) Boutique/Bags to Go provide clothing, shoes, food, and toiletries, paired with job skills, healthcare, and financial literacy services; (2) Diaper Pantry serves families with infants; (3) Collaborative partnerships expand access to clothing and resources for vulnerable residents.
Postpartum Support Virginia (PSVa)	\$ 13,738	Healthy Moms+, Healthy Babies program provides the following services to families who reside in PWC in English and Spanish: year-round warmline, social support groups, Mothers & Babies curriculum-based groups, peer mentors, and professional care coordination.
The Women's Center	\$ 25,000	Through the Enhanced Access to Mental Health Program, the Center provides culturally appropriate trauma informed mental health counseling services to low-income, uninsured and disproportionate community members of all ages, races, ethnicities and genders— regardless of their ability to pay. In 2023 the Program provided 1,117 hours to PWC residents.
Boxes of Basics	\$ 55,000	Funding will be used to provide children a full seasonal wardrobe, each Box of Basics contains an entire seasonal wardrobe curated for an individual child, including multiple school and play outfits, and essentials.
Literacy Volunteers of America Prince William	\$ 35,000	LVA-PW provides low-income, low literate PWC residents with ESL (reading, writing, speaking, listening) classes while integrating health literacy topics throughout the year. This includes teaching parents of students at PWCS Title 1 schools. We offer classes in ESL, Digital Literacy, Health Literacy, and Citizenship. All classes are free.
Casa BruMar Foundation	\$ 7,000	Education and resource support - Funds will provide expenditure capacity for production & printing cost of reference materials for PWC Crisis Intervention Training, annual symposiums, and resource fairs.
Virginia Community Food Connect	\$ 75,000	Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Virginia Fresh Match (VFM) at the Dale City Farmers Market.

Pink Space Theory	\$ 5,000	Pink Space Theory provides workforce development for youth ages 6 to 18 by offering mentorship, internships, and skill-building programs that enhance educational, leadership, and life skills. Through hands-on workshops, youth master advanced math, technology/coding, science, engineering, and entrepreneurial skills.
CFH. Inc.	\$ 5,000	Senior Emergency Financial assistance program will assist adults 62 or older or living with a disability and receiving compensation such as SSI or SSDI, living in Prince William County with past due rent or utilities, medical payments or other emergencies with up to \$500 a year. Residents we assist will also be eligible for minimal case management services to help find additional resources that will help stabilize their household. With the funds we are requesting our goal is to provide assistance for a minimum of 10 families.
Top Ladies of Distinction Haymarket	\$ 5,000	We request funding to support the ongoing community outreach of this chapter. The funds will allow us to continue doing a host of activities with our Top Teens of America to community beautification at the Bull Run Willing Warriors Center, creating and making holiday decor and engagement with various senior citizen facilities. The funding will also be used to assist with our food and clothing drives, that actively support local shelters and our adopted school. In addition actions that impact our adopted school such as donating school supplies, new/gently used books and hygiene items for their clothing closet will be helped greatly. Also, our Top Teens will be able to attend training and leadership events in our local area.
