EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) recommends that the Park and Recreation Commission (PRC) endorse disbursement of \$193,000 in Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 budgeted funds for Arts Grants to eighteen (18) non-profit arts organizations based in Prince William County and the Cities of Manassas and Manassas Park in accordance with the County's Arts Grants Policy.

BACKGROUND

DPR coordinates a competitive grant program to provide operational support for non-profit arts organizations based in Prince William County and the Cities of Manassas and Manassas Park who collectively serve Prince William County residents. Grants are awarded in conformance with the Arts Grant Policy, which was adopted by the BOCS on March 13, 2018 (RES. No 18-144). The BOCS budgeted and appropriated \$193,000 for Arts Grants in the Fiscal Year 2026 Operating Budget.

As required by the Arts Grant Policy, on February 19, 2025, the PRC appointed a six (6) member Arts Grants Panel to score applications. The panel members have a range of experience in financial management, arts education, grant oversight, and non-profit management and are Prince William County residents. An employee of the Prince William County Finance Department also serves on the panel as a standing member.

The Grant Application deadline for FY 2026 funding was April 18, 2025. DPR received eighteen (18) grant applications from eligible arts organizations. For the FY 2026 grant cycle, DPR conducted an extensive outreach campaign to promote awareness and encourage new applicants from the local arts community. This outreach resulted in four (4) first time applicants. The Arts Grants Panel reviewed each application for completeness and compliance with the grant requirements and recommended all eighteen (18) applications for funding, totaling \$193,000. DPR staff provided oversight of application scoring for conformance with the Arts Grants Policy.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is the recommendation of staff that the Parks and Recreation Commission endorse the FY 2026 Arts Grant disbursements as recommended by the Arts Grant Panel.

Service Level / Policy Impact

These grant funds will help greater Prince William area arts organizations advance their missions through operational support.

The \$193,000 for the Arts Grants program was included in the adopted FY 2026 operating budget.

Legal Impact

Grant awards comply with Virginia Code Section 15.2-953(A) which permits localities to "make appropriations of public funds to any charitable institution or association located within their respective limits or outside of their respective limits if such institution or association provides services to the residents of the locality."

ACTION:

WHEREAS, §15.2-953 of the Code of Virginia authorizes the Prince William Board of County Supervisors (BOCS) to make appropriations of public funds to charitable institutions that serve residents of the County; and

WHEREAS, the BOCS budgeted and appropriated \$193,000 in the Fiscal Year 2025 Operating Budget for the Arts Grant program, which provides programming and operational support for non-profit arts organizations that serve the Greater Prince William County area, which includes Prince William County and the cities of Manassas and Manassas Park; and

WHEREAS, grants are awarded in conformance with the Arts Grant Policy, which was adopted by the BOCS on March 13, 2018 (BOCS RES. No 18-144); and

WHEREAS, the current policy requires that awardees are based in Greater Prince William County and 80% of an awardee's attendees/participants reside in Greater Prince William or the awardee produces at least 70% of their programs in Greater Prince William; and

WHEREAS, the Arts Grant Program is not affiliated with the Arts Council although many Arts Council members apply; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) staff facilitated a mandatory grant application workshop and received eighteen (18) grant applications from eligible organizations, including four (4) first time applicants; and

WHEREAS, on February 19, 2025, the Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) appointed an Arts Grant Panel to review Arts Grant applications and recommend fund disbursement; and

WHEREAS, the Arts Grant Panel reviewed all applications and recommended approval of all eighteen (18) applications for funding; and

WHEREAS, DPR staff confirms that the grant policy was followed and concurs with the disbursement of the FY26 Arts Grants;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Prince William County Parks and Recreation Commission hereby recommends the Fiscal Year 2026 Arts Grant disbursements to the Prince William Board of County Supervisors.
