# Making the Best Better: Senior 4-Her Danny Schrantz and his 4-H Story

The 2025 State 4-H Horse Show was the culminating, year-end program event for 4-Her, Danny Schrantz and his horse, Shimmer. Danny has been a 4-Her for 8 years and is supported by his family, his club leaders, Tracey Whysong and Dee Wilkinson, and his extension agent in Prince William, Mary Beth Lerch. This year, Danny participated in the Adaptive Rider division at the State 4-H Horse Show and wrapped up his show by completing the Senior Stampede. Hear below from Danny and his Mom, Jenny, about his time in the Virginia 4-H Horse Program.

When asked what his favorite memories of the State 4-H Horse Show were, Danny provided a short answer of camping on the grounds and spending time with other members of his 4-H Club. However, he asked if he could share more about his 4-H Journey and how the program had impacted him. Danny was born with Cerebral Palsy, and many doctors told his parents that he would never walk unassisted. Equine therapy was brought up as a method to help him potentially walk in the future, however the potential costs were monumental. Danny's mom, Jenny, decided that they could do it themselves and matched 4 year old Danny, with his horse, 4 year old Shimmer, who, as Danny says, was in need of direction. The outcome is that Danny can now walk better with crutches and after 14 years of riding Shimmer, they have made quite the team.

Some of Danny's favorite memories with Shimmer include getting attacked by hornets, hit by an ambulance, and even Shimmer falling down once while they were riding! However, their 4 years at the State Horse Show have been some of their best memories and helped them to grow together as a team.

Danny's mom, Jenny, and the rest of his family have been constant supporters of Danny's 4-H journey, whether that be in riding or educational events. Jenny is thankful for Danny's 4-H family and wishes for everyone to know what the adaptive rider program and the inclusivity of Virginia 4-H can do for young people. For Danny, these opportunities have been life changing, strengthening his body, building his confidence, and fostering emotional resilience.

### Virginia State 4-H Horse Show: Recapped

The 64th Annual State 4-H Horse Show was held in Lexington, Virginia at the Virginia Horse Center in early September. This year's show continued to see an increase in numbers, with 325 horse and rider combinations entered to compete in the 4 day event. During this event, we saw exhibitors showing in any of 9 total divisions offered, taking part in our district challenge educational contests, and competing in the portfolio/recordbook and art/photography contest. In addition to these competitive opportunities, exhibitors had a chance to chill at the ice cream social, sponsored by the Rockingham Cooperative and Triple Crown Equine Nutrition and visit the Silent Auction, put on by the Golden Horseshoe 4-H Club to benefit the State 4-H Horse Show.







Along with the events listed above, 4-Hers also came together to represent their units and clubs during the Parade of Units on Friday evening, showcasing the 43 Units and 58 total 4-H clubs represented during the show. Our pre-determined shape this year was a unicorn, in memory of 4-H Agent, Kaci Daniel, who was a long-time Agent on Duty and volunteer at the State Horse Show in addition to supporting youth from across the state at various other events throughout the year.

Additionally, we had the opportunity to recognize the 2024-2025 Virginia 4-H Horse Ambassadors, the Connie Collier Scholarship Recipient, Zoe Bowman of King George, and our Horse Show Heroes during that same event. During the closing ceremonies on Saturday, we recognized Beth Jones of Henrico as our Horse Show Nail Award Winner, for being an invaluable asset to the event, and Carrie Swanson for her State Show Hall of Fame Nomination. Carrie has been assisting at the show for more than 20 years!

Finally, we would like to express a sincere thank you to ALL who help to make this show possible. ### State Fair Junior Dairymen's Contest—Results are in!

The State Fair Junior Dairymen's Contest was held on Friday, September 26 in conjunction with the State Fair of Virginia Dairy Show in Doswell, VA. 273 Youth formed over 75 teams to compete in this contest for the opportunity to win both ribbons and scholarships from the State Fair of Virginia.

Youth competing in this contest had to excel in 4 different areas, including a written exam, live dairy judging classes, in person stations, and DHIA. In the stations sections, youth had to identify a multitude of dairy related items and objects including feeds, dairy equipment, cattle handling equipment, and dairy products.

The Horse Ambassador Program utilizes senior youth who are enrolled members of 4-H to grow in their leadership skills, assist with state level events, and publicly represent the Virginia 4-H Horse Program at industry level events.

This year, ambassadors attended 4-H Day at the Capitol, where they saw

legislation in action and were able to visit with the VA 4-H Youth Livestock Ambassadors. They also had a visit to the Meadow Event Park for a tour of Secretariat's birthplace. Ambassadors assisted at the Block and Bridle Horse Weekend, Equismartz, State 4-H Congress, and the Rockingham Coop Equine Expo.

### 4-H Youth Livestock Ambassadors—Short Course

The first cohort of the Virginia 4-H Youth Livestock Ambassadors took to the ground running at the 2024 State Fair of Virginia Youth Livestock Shows, where they assisted with shows and met with Governor Glenn Youngkin on his visit to the barns. Since then, these exceptional 4-H representatives have been busy on the local, district, and state level, assisting their 4-H Agents with programs in their own locality, helping with district- and state-wide contests and shows, and collecting community service hours.







Ambassadors attended a 3-day short course, held in Blacksburg, in August. The short course included a harvesting demonstration at the Virginia Tech Meats Science Lab, ultrasound pregnancy checking at the Kentland Repro Barn, a tour of the Virginia Tech Swine Center and Dairy, and a carriage-ride tour of McDonald Farms. Ambassadors also learned about agritourism from Rose Jeter of Jeter Farm, government relations and engaging stakeholders from Samuel Hadacek with the Virginia Cattlemen's Association, and social media awareness from the media team for the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences.

As part of their term, ambassadors were also tasked with identifying a need within the Youth Animal Science program on the county/city, district, or state level, planning a program to fill that need, and delivering the program. Ambassadors presented on their projects at the 2025 Virginia 4-H Youth Livestock Ambassador Short Course. Projects included: Sunshine Showmanship implementation at a county show, "How To" Reasons videos, Preparing for Showmanship videos, National Livestock Breeds project conducted with a middle school agriculture class, and Novice Showman packets.
